




\$4,100,000,000


THE BENEFITS OF SCHOLARSHIPS!

Reduce out-of-pocket cost for tuition.

They don't have to be paid back!

Diverse options for all students.





TYPES OF SCHOLARSHIPS

MERIT-BASED

Available to students based on their academics, including grades or test scores.

ATHLETIC

Available to students participating on a school's team and typically awarded by the school.

STUDENT-SPECIFIC

Available to students who meet the required personal attributes.

Examples are military families, minority groups, low-income, etc.

HOBBIES-INTERESTS

Available to students who meet the required interests.

Examples include scholarships for dance, speaking a foreign language, STEM major, etc.





Program Eligibility

- Open to Arizona Residents, admitted to ASU in the fall who are degree-seeking, full-time freshman
- *Note: This includes Native American high school seniors who are not residing in Arizona who meet the Arizona residency criteria for tuition purposes at ASU.
- Must be enrolled at ASU at the beginning of the fall semester, immediately after Arizona high school graduation.
- Must demonstrate a total annual family income of \$42,400 or less on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Program Eligibility (cont.)

- The Obama Scholars Program will be closed for the year when program funds have been exhausted.
- Must be eligible to receive Federal Pell Grant
- ASU Online degree programs are not eligible.
 If you change your major to an ASU Online
 major, you will be removed from the Obama
 Scholars Program and adjustments will be
 made to your awards.

Continuing in the ASU Obama Scholar Program

- Successfully complete 24 ASU credit hours during each academic year
- *Note (a minimum of 12 ASU credit hours in the fall and in spring semester)
- MUST maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.50 by the end of each academic year (end of spring semester)
- Your award package is available for up to eight full-time, consecutive fall and spring semesters.
- *Note: ASU recommends you enroll in 15 credit hours in order to complete your degree in four years.


Continuing in the ASU Obama Scholar Program (Cont.)


- You must remain Federal Pell Grant eligible.
- You must remain eligible for federal aid to participate in this program each year.
- You must maintain satisfactory academic progress; however, the GPA requirements of this program supersede the Satisfactory Academic Progress GPA.
- ASU students are expected to abide by the Student Code of Conduct. Violation(s) of the Student Code of Conduct resulting in a suspension, expulsion or administrative withdrawal will result in loss of your scholarship.










Resources at your fingertips





- You can search your future college/university website for scholarship and work-study opportunities.
- Ask your counselor for known scholarships.
- Ask community organizations for scholarship opportunities.
- Ask your employer for scholarship offers (i.e. Starbucks offer its employees a chance at receiving a full ride to ASU's online degree programs.)
- Visit your local libraries (i.e. College Depot)



WHAT TO LOOK FOR!

- Look for keywords that apply to you (e.g.
 "first generation", "Hispanic", "STEM major",
 "pre-med", etc.)
- This will help your search for scholarships much easier, and help you find the right one for you.
- Look at the due date and eligibility requirements before all else.
- You don't want to get your hopes up only to find out you don't meet the requirements or the due date has already passed.





The Review Process



The review process for every scholarship is different. Some look at it in a holistic view, while pthers are very specific.





After the deadline, scholarships often take 1-2 months to be reviewed and announce their winner.




But typically , they will create:


- A simple online application process.
- A review process where
 they examine your activities
 and accomplishments,
 determine eligibility, weed
 out applicants, and meet
 the requirements.
- They narrow down their list.
- They select a winner.





Proposition 308 Update



- What is PROP-308?
 - Arizona voters passed Prop 308 in November 2022
 - Proposition 308, recently passed in Arizona, allows undocumented immigrants who graduate from an Arizona high school to pay in-state tuition vs. out-of-state tuition.
- Starting Fall 2023, the public in-state universities have began awarding funding to all students.



• All students regardless of immigration status may be eligible for institutional financial aid and merit based scholarships.


