
EFC Becomes SAI

EFC: Expected Family Contribution

- A calculation of the family's contribution to the student's education, from parent and student assets and income
- EFC was generally divided by the number of students enrolled at least 50% in college
 - 2 in college with \$10,000 EFC
 - **\$5000** contribution for each student
- Split by quarter / semester

SAI: Student Aid Index

- A calculation of how much financial aid may be awarded to meet the student's calculated need
- SAI will not be divided by number in college
 - > 2 in college with \$10,000 SAI
 - \$10,000 eligibility for each student
- SAI is applied for each term
- Student has an automatic SAI of \$0 if a family does not file taxes

Be attentive and interact with those you meet




Take pictures and notes



Understanding Holistic Review

► "Individualized holistic review is a cornerstone of admissions among institutions with varying levels of selectivity. Despite the remarkable variability among institutions types – with respect to mission, setting, and more – key points of effective practice continue to guide the field." (Coleman & Keith, College Board 2022)



University of California System



- CA Prop 209 passed in 1996 and prohibits the consideration of a applicant's race and/or gender in individual admission decisions
- Comprehensive review was created in response to the shift in population applying and enrolling
- UC Application nine campuses and one set of requirements (no interviews, no recommendations, transcripts, portfolios or research papers
- 13 Factors (removal of testing): These criteria include both quantitative and qualitative, academic and personal accomplishment
- Purpose of Personal Insight questions (350 words)
- Additional comments: Academic and Personal (550)

University of Oregon



- Strength in Academic coursework and trend: 4yr Eng, 4yr Math, 3yr Science/Social Science, 2yr FL, rigor of elective coursework, cumulative/weighted GPA
- Personal Statement, secondary essay: Required secondary – optional unless applying for selective programs/scholarship
- Extracurricular activities/special talents

University of Michigan

- Individualized, holistic review process created in 2003 following Grutter v. Bollinger & Gratz v. Bollinger SCOTUS rulings
- Proposal 2 (Michigan 06-2) passed in 2006, prohibiting the consideration of race, color, sex, or religion in college admissions at publicly funded institutions
- Apply directly to one of nine UM schools/colleges
- Secondary School Academic performance Grades, curriculum, test scores if provided
- Counselor & Teacher Recommendation
- Essays: Personal Statement, two supplemental (100-300/550 words)
- Awards/honors, involvement, leadership, service




